Sample Home Safety Checklist (page 2)

Stoves, Furnaces, and Heaters	Household appliances are disconnected before repairs.
Stoves are away from curtains.	Unused, open, screw-type sockets are plugged closed.
Stoves & furnaces are inspected & cleaned annually.	Frayed or worn electric cords are promptly replaced.
Gas burners are properly adjusted and free from leaks.	Long trailing cords are not in evidence.
Gas water and space heaters are equipped with vents or flues.	Cords are kept out from under rugs, doors, and furniture.
Water heater or boiler has a safety valve & is checked yearly.	UA-approved extension cords are the proper size.
Flames of gas burners are protected from drafts.	Children are taught never to touch electric sockets or fixtures.
Insulating shield protects woodwork within 18" of furnace, etc.	Fuses are adequate for the load and are not bypassed.
Keep flammable materials away from stoves, furnaces, etc.	Circuit breakers are not overloaded.

Porch, Yard, and Garage	At least one smoke detector in each bedroom & garage.
Railings and banisters are sound and inspected periodically.	Everything has a place and is in its place.
Steps and walks are kept free from ice and snow.	Stepladders are in good repair and stored out of the way.
Yard/play space are free from holes, stones, glass, etc.	Window screens and storm windows are securely fastened.
Tools and dangerous articles are out of reach of children.	Guns are stored unloaded and in locked cases.
Dangerous products & chemicals are kept in original	Guns and ammunition are stored separately.

Wires and low fences are brightly painted or clearly marked.	Housework clothing has no drooping sleeves, sashes, or frills.

An area is marked off in the garage for bicycles, wagons, etc.	Kerosene, gasoline, paint thinners, and other volatile materials

Workshop	Oil mops, dust rags, painting equipment, and other oily materials are stored outside in open metal containers.
Good ventilation exists, especially when sanding.	Everyone turns on a light before entering a dark room.
Safety goggles and/or face mask are available, with eyewash.	Matches are extinguished before they're thrown away.
Baking soda is kept handy to neutralize acid burns.	Children are never permitted to play with matches.
All electrical tools are either three-wire or double-insulated.	Fire extinguishers are readily available.
Work area is well lit & free of clutter, scraps, rags.

Guards are in place on all power tools.	Know how to get emergency help (911, poison control, etc.).
